

The Book of Ephesians #1

A number of years ago, I, like Paul, had an awakening - my own road to Damascus experience if you like. I'd always called myself a Christian. But when I sang the words of the chorus to King of Kings, Majesty (I lay my all before you now) one particular Sunday, I realised that I really meant it. Not everyone has such an experience; some have always known Jesus as Lord, for some it's a gradual process and for some it's a single moment. Anyway, the first book of the Bible I read after this experience, alongside a wise friend for guidance, was Ephesians. It's become my 'go to' whenever I need anything at all. In six short chapters, Paul explains pretty much everything there is to know about what following Christ means for our lives.

If you don't mind, I'd like to share some of what makes this letter to a first century church so central to me. Some of my comments you will agree with, some you won't. I welcome your thoughts. Also, you may wonder why a particular verse seems important to me when clearly another strikes you much more when you read the text (which I encourage you to do). We often refer to the Bible as God's 'living word' and it is just that. It seems to change with every reading, words coming sharply into focus one day that at other times simply pass us by.

Chapter one.

Paul opens his letter with a greeting to the members of the church in Ephesus, in modern day Turkey. All the letters Paul sent began with "grace and peace to you" sometimes adding "from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ". This way, the reader knows that whatever comes next - guidance or chastisement - it comes from a place that is rooted in the love of God.

Verses 3 to 14 outline the development of God's chosen race. Before the world was created, God knew the plans he had for his people. The Hebrew nation were, through birth, children of God. Then through Jesus, everyone who accepted His teaching was adopted into God's family. Through believing, we have redemption, the forgiveness of sin and we have "the riches of God's grace that he lavished on us." Now Paul spreads this more widely, out of the area around Jerusalem. As the people of Ephesus heard and believed the word of truth, they too were included in God's family. They had been "marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit."

The next couple of verses show how much it means to Paul that more and more people are becoming followers of Christ. You can hear his energy: "I have not stopped...", "I keep asking..." Even though the church has been established, he knows there is still more to be done to know Jesus better.

Perhaps my favourite part of the whole book is verses 18 and 19. "I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe." The eyes of your heart. The knowledge of God's love isn't in your head, it's in your heart. Yes, you can read and learn, but God's power in our life is felt by our whole being. That power, says Paul, is far greater than any other deity we can call on. The power that raised Christ from the dead and placed him at God's right hand with everything at his feet.

To summarise chapter one, we see the beginning of the spread of Christianity through the Eastern Mediterranean. Being an heir of God is no longer a birthright, but freely given to all who embrace the love of Christ. Through Paul's eagerness to proclaim the Good News we, the reader of today, become infected with his desire to know Jesus for ourselves.

St John's

After 150 years St Johns finally came to an end in June.

The work in Moorside started in the 19th century the very early days are recorded, and I copy below

December 1869

'Cottage lectures are now being held every week, Mondays at Mrs Birk's Moorside Lane'

February 1870

A Sunday Evening Service has been commenced in the Castle School near Lum Station for the benefit of the inhabitants of that portion of the Parish'

1885

Mission Church from St Mary's opened in two cottages on Moorside Street

And so the seeds were planted, in 1888 the foundation stone for a new Mission Church was laid and the building opened in February 1889 almost twenty years after the first seed. It was 1890 before the name St John's Mission was first used.

St Johns became a local hub in Moorside, both the congregation and the community were involved

In 1944 the arrival of Rev S. F. Irwin caused quite a shake up; he did not like the Church facing west, the entrance was awkward and there were other problems. It was decided plans should be drawn up to turn the Church round, the door to be along the path The 60th Anniversary Service and celebrations in the 'new look' Church were on 15th December 1945. They continued improving by buying an organ in 1949.

St John's had a field on Jack Lane which was also used by many in the community, but this was compulsorily purchased in 1949 for the building of Hawthorn Road South flats, the council later bought the sports pavilion in 1951.

In 1952 it was decided to purchase the piece of scrap land, where the building now stands for £250. Plans for the new school were drawn up by Mr R Waite who gave his services for free.

Fundraising started in earnest which included collections from the local community on a regular basis and an estimate for a shell was sought, sadly there was shortfall but this didn't deter them and work commenced. However a major problem arose after the foundations for the hall itself had been laid and it was announced a new main water pipe would be going up the side (Haweswater) as a consequence all the rooms on the side had to be reduced by about

four foot. Much of the internal work was undertaken by volunteers and the rest as funds could be raised.

In 1970 the Diocesan Pastoral Committee felt that either the Church or the Hall must close and after much discussion it was decided the Church would close. The hall became a dual purpose building with the first service there in 1972. By 1979 it was decided to turn round once again, the stage was lowered and became a Sanctuary with doors to close it off when not in use. This is how many remember it.

The Parish decided to cease services but the building continued to be used, Church organisations the Band and Mums and Tots continued, it was the area polling station, first aid courses for childminders, local meetings and even children's parties plus other events as arranged.

Now it has a new owner who are planning services and community work.

The Group has run several successful fun events for parents/guardians as well as residents in the local community – quiz nights, camps, shows.

We have had several current and ex members of the group achieve some big awards over the last 12 months, with Nicholas Curtis becoming a Queen Scout and achieving his Duke of Edinburgh Gold award. Several impressive awards in the younger sections too – a fantastic achievement for our young members and a reflection of the hard work they, their families and their leaders have put in over the years!

Several Scouts attended the District Summer Camp to Dorset and Nicholas Curtis represented the Group and District as a member of the International Service Team at the 24th World Scout Jamboree in summer 2019.

Several sections are successfully managing to run some online activities with their members during the current period and others are assessing how they may be able to follow suit soon. We have also started a local advertising campaign in the hope to bolster youth membership (and maybe even adult volunteers) once Scouting activities are permitted to resume.

The Scout Hut is in a state of severe disrepair (so much so that if Scouting activities had not had to cease in March, we would likely have been searching for alternate accommodation over summer anyway). As such, we are currently trying to engage with local trades people to repair/replace the hut flooring, bathrooms and other items that have either broken or become so in need of replacement that they were becoming a health and safety risk. Much of the recent small business grant received from the Local Authority will be going towards sorting out the premises so they will hopefully be ready again before Scouting activities are able to resume.
