

#### 2020, a year to forget?

And there it was, gone. The year of bubbles and social distancing. In some ways 2020 has flown by and yet it has also seemed endless. So many people are saying that it's been a year to forget. But there is also so much to remember and celebrate.

We can forget those months when pubs and things were closed and remember the glorious weather that meant we could spend entire days in the open air.

We can forget the supermarket queues and empty shelves and remember how many found the joy of growing their own fruit and veg.

We can forget the closed places of worship and celebrate that we found new ways of being church, many of which will continue in the future.

Who, though, can forget the lost jobs and lower incomes? But even that didn't stop the great British public raising millions of pounds for good causes such as Capt Sir Tom's walk.

For me, the main thing I want to forget about 2020 is the lack of physical contact with others. I really miss a big hug. St Paul wrote to the church in Corinth and Rome, urging them to "greet one another with a holy kiss." We are well used to doing that aren't we, especially during the sharing of the Peace. Will we ever be able to do that again?

Towards the end of the year, it seemed that there was light at the end of the tunnel as several vaccines were developed in record time. The first to be approved and rolled out was the Pfizer BioNTech. At last vulnerable people and front line workers were being immunised. Human

contact, for so long denied to those we love, is edging closer. It's close, but not yet here. There's a period of impatient waiting before we are released from restrictions.

It strikes me that this must be what the Hebrews felt like as they waited for a Messiah. The Emmanuel who would be their vaccine against oppression, their shot in the arm who would fulfill the prophecies of the Old Testament. Mary and Joseph were the first to be inoculated. They both knew their baby was the Son of God, the angels had told them followed by the shepherds, and the wise men. Then there was the wait for the child to grow up and become the Saviour of the world. It was close, but not yet here.

There's another comparison in that when it's available, we can choose whether or not to receive the vaccine just as we can choose to accept Jesus as our Lord and Saviour. But then the metaphor breaks down.

Jesus' love is free for all, there's no charge for being saved. We don't have to fall into any category to be eligible, young or old we are all invited. We don't have to go back for a second dose, He keeps us topped up every day. When we receive Jesus into our hearts, we are truly released. There are no restrictions, no curfews.

As we begin a new year, let us patiently wait for that day when all the rules will be relaxed, and we can once again greet each other with a holy kiss. And SING!!

#### Knit a Simple Beanie Hat for the Homeless

Double knitting wool and size 4mm needles

Cast on 110 stitches and knit (K) 1 purl (P) 1 for 15 rows.

Continue in stocking stitch (K 1 row P 1 row) until the work measures 15cms (6ins) from the cast on edge, ending with a P row.

Next row, K9, K2 together (tog), repeat until the end of the row. Next and every alternate row

Next row K8, K2 tog, repeat until the end of the row

Continue like this, decreasing one stitch each time until you have done K1, K2 tog. Now P2 tog along the line.

Break off a long thread and thread all the stitches onto it and pull tightly. Sew edges together.
