Peter's Story

It was amazing going into Jerusalem with Jesus! All the crowds cheered and waved palm branches. We thought the time had finally come when he'd be revealed as the Messiah, and everyone would know.

Just a few weeks earlier, he'd asked us who everyone thinks he is, so we told him that not everyone believes, but some people think he's a prophet. But I said, "I know who you are, Jesus. You're the Messiah, the one sent by God to save us." I was as sure of that as I've been of anything. He said something about setting his face to Jerusalem, and how he'd have to die. We didn't really know what he meant back then. But Jesus was funny like that - just when we thought we'd got it, we'd realise that we really hadn't at all.

That first day, we had a relaxing evening at the home of Mary, Martha and Lazarus. Jesus liked going there as they were always so welcoming, and so eager to listen to his teaching about God's kingdom. But then, after that, things got really strange so that we never knew what to expect from one day to the next! First, there was the visit to the temple when Jesus made a whip out of ropes and started shouting and knocking the traders' tables over! He drove them right out of the temple! After that he even cursed a fig tree. Funny that, a fig tree was always a special tree, a symbol of our people and our special relationship with God.

Then, the highlight of the week: the Passover meal. Some of the others had got everything arranged, the women had prepared the food, and we were looking forward to celebrating together. In all the busyness there was no one to wash our feet when we came in, so Jesus knelt down and did it himself. I could hardly bear it! I said some silly thing about having a whole bath! But Jesus said it was only my feet that needed a wash,

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and that following him made us clean. He always could make everyday things connect with God's ways.

After we'd eaten, we went out to the hillside to pray and sing in the cool evening breeze. But just then, Judas, who'd somehow left the meal earlier, turned up with a company of temple guards and Jesus was arrested. I got my sword out to protect Jesus, but found I'd got it wrong again. Jesus healed the young man and agreed to go with them. I followed and watched them take Jesus right into the High Priest's house. I tried to keep a low profile while I waited to see what was going to happen, but pretty soon they'd cottoned on to the fact that I was from Galilee and must be with Jesus. I was so scared I denied it! How could I? I knew he was the Messiah, but it all just went so quickly. I panicked and said I didn't even know him. Then I heard the cock crow. How bitterly I wept! Such a coward! After all the good I'd seen Jesus do for others!

The next few days went in a blur. We heard he was going to be crucified. John and some of the women went out with Mary to the hillside to be with Jesus. I couldn't bear it. If only I could have spoken up for him at the high priest's house. Maybe I could have saved him! But we hid away, wondering if they'd come after us too.

That was a few of days ago, and now, one of the women, Mary Magdalene, said she's seen him alive! She said the tomb was empty, but she saw him alive, and he spoke to her! She said she was especially to tell me as well. I wonder what he'd have to say to me, after all the mistakes I've made? We thought he was the one! What will happen to us now...?

Why not join us as we journey through the Easter story again, and see what God might say to you.

Mothering Sunday

I realise this should have been in the March diary but as most of us will be picking this edition up on Mothering Sunday, I thought it was still appropriate. Christine

Mothering Sunday was originally a time when people returned to the church in which they were Baptised or where they attended services when they were children. This meant that families were reunited as adults returned to the towns and villages where they grew up.

Traditionally, people observed a fast during Lent and did not eat sweet, rich foods or meat. However, the fast was lifted slightly on Mothering



Sunday and many people prepared a simnel cake to eat with their family on this day. A simnel cake is a light fruit cake covered with a layer of marzipan and with a layer of marzipan baked into the middle of the cake. Traditionally, simnel cakes are decorated with 11 or 12 balls of marzipan, representing the 11 disciples and sometimes, Jesus Christ.

In time, it became customary for young people who were working as servants in large houses, to be given a holiday on Mothering Sunday. They could use this day to visit their own mother and often took a gift of food or hand-me-down clothing from their employers to her. In turn, this moved towards the modern holiday, on which people still visit and take gifts to their mothers.

Mother's Day is a secular festival invented in 1907 by Anna Jarvis (an American). The first Mother's Day Service being held in a church in Grafton, West Virginia and it is celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May in most countries of the world – the UK seeming to be the exception to this as we celebrate "Mid-Lent".

Beauty in Brokenness

During Lent I chose to read one of the Church of England led daily reflections.

One day, after a particularly bad news bulletin, I read that day's passage and reflection. It was titled 'Beauty in brokenness'. The bible passage was Psalm 147 v 1-7.

The reflection spoke of a church in Graveney where there is a cross. Not unexpected in a church. However, this cross is made from 121 rusty nails from the old church door and set into Perspex to form a cross. What was apparently broken and useless became something beautiful and meaningful.

In Psalm 147, the psalmist praises a God who heals the broken hearted, lifts the humble, restores those who trust in him and offers healing.

That day's news bulletin included wars, famine, benefit cuts, knife crime and very little positivity. Where was the beauty in the brokenness? How can we exchange brokenness for beauty?

As I reflected a song came to mind. One which I shared on Facebook and in our bible study group. Graham Kendrick had expressed the vision of Beauty for Brokenness perfectly.

Trust in the Lord and perhaps we can make the broken into something beautiful.

Input the surname and first name (or initial) and then tick Second world war.

This will result in a listing of matching names

As we know all our searches relate to our parish the Droylsden name is a match. In this case there is an additional forename for the deceased. If you click on the MORE DETAILS button you will then find out more details about when and where they died. It may also give more information. There will certificates etc that you can print off.

If you want to find out more information about where they lived etc you can look at census although the info may be limited. There may be some baptism records in our church registers.

We need to be sensitive in our searches as it is likely that relatives of the deceased are still living locally.

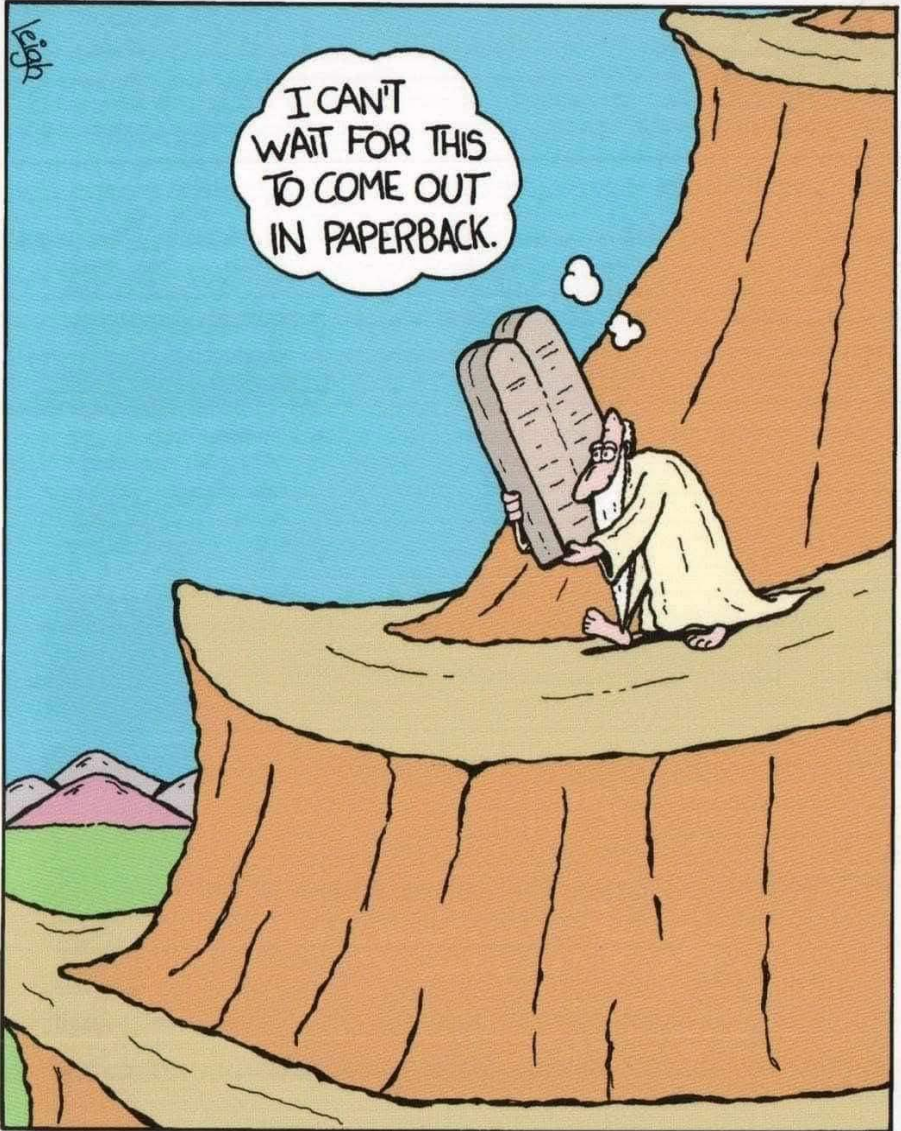
