Sir Christmas and the Captain of Revelry!



Ever since I was young, my family had 'stockings' to leave by our beds for Father Christmas, and even my parents had stockings to open on Christmas morning. Traditions are hard to shake, and we still tend to give each other 'stocking presents' opened first thing in the morning with a cup of tea before breakfast.

Some kind of Father Christmas figure has been part of our Christmas traditions for many hundreds of years, though it has changed dramatically over the centuries. In the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries a Christmas character known as *Captain Christmas* would oversee the feasting and revelry in aristocratic houses. They also had a carol about *Sir Christmas*, who sounds a lot more gentlemanly!

Santa Claus was initially drawn from the veneration of St Nicholas, the 4^{th} century Bishop from Turkey. In the Netherlands he was celebrated by leaving gifts for children on the night before his celebration day on 6^{th} December. It was said that Sinterklaas (St Nicholas) went through locked doors, and down chimneys to leave gifts in children's shoes. (Sounds familiar, doesn't it?)

Over the years these two traditions merged and took on the more family-friendly version we know today. It is interesting that over such a long period, a personal Christmas character who sums up the heart of the season (whether in revelry or gift-giving!), has remained a strong part of our Christmas traditions.

What would it mean for us to show the generosity, humility, hope and love of God seen in the birth of Jesus as real-life 'Sir Christmas' (or Miss, Mrs Christmas) in our families, and in our communities?

Another year of shoebox making, giving shoebox fillers and OCC Coffee Morning and Donations comes to an end but as you read this in our Church Diary the boxes will be checked and packed into large boxes down in Coventry, Samaritan's Purse HQ. From Coventry they will be transported by lorry to Eastern Europe countries, possibly a majority to Ukraine, or shipped to West Africa. When they arrive in the country, plans will be in place to transport them to the many locations in their country, which maybe churches, schools, orphanages, hospitals or the homes of needy families.

Our Coffee Morning in early October raised £129.71 and the OCC Donations Box had £164.40 at the end of October, making a total of £294.11 which is sent from St Mary's to Samaritan's Purse for OCC.

We had 70 Shoeboxes collected and taken for their onward journey, along with thousands of other boxes, to help make children happy and thankful that someone has made a Christmas Box for them.

After receiving a shoebox gift, children have the opportunity to enrol in The Greatest Journey - 12 fun and interactive Bible lessons, where they get the chance to discover who Jesus is and how to begin their own journey of faith.

Thank you to all who have given and helped in anyway in this year's Operation Christmas Child.

Who wouldn't want 25% extra free?!





January 2026 not only marks the start of a new calendar year but also a new financial year in the life of the church.

Each year, we rely on the generosity of our congregation for their stewardship and donations from visitors to be able to contribute to the upkeep of our church building, as well as helping to fund our clergy and the various groups and services we hold – without your gifts, we would struggle to deliver those activities to the fullest.

We are truly grateful for all the gifts we receive, especially in the current economic climate, so we need to maximise the donations we do receive. The easiest way is to ensure as many of us as possible donate via the envelope scheme or via standing order **AND** have completed a **Gift Aid Declaration Form**. If you are a UK taxpayer and you haven't already

done so, please complete the form which allows St Mary's to claim **25p** from HMRC for every £1 you donate. So, if you gift £10 per week, we can claim an additional £2.50 from the tax man! This will not cost you any extra money!! Forms are available in church – please ask me, Pat or Beth.

It is important that as many donors gift aid, where possible, because the amount we can claim back against the amount donated is uncapped. Donations made on the contactless machine can also be treated in the same way. If you are a UK taxpayer, please complete a gift aid declaration when prompted on the machine (you only need to complete it once) when you donate, and every payment you make thereafter on the same card will be recognised and treated as a gift aid donation. If anyone needs any assistance with this, please do give me a shout.

Any money given on the plate during the offertory hymn, donations via the contactless machine and money given via the envelope scheme by non-taxpayers is also eligible for 25p from every £1 donated but there are restrictions, and it is capped at £8,000 per annum. This year, we reached the £8,000 threshold and therefore lost out on the tax relief against £1,200 which is £300 this was a great shame. Naturally, we want to capitalise as much as possible on your precious donations, so this was a frustration and one we want to avoid this year.

Many of you gift via the envelope scheme; the new envelopes for 2026 will be available to collect in the church room from early December. If anyone does not currently have an offertory envelope and would like a box, please let me, Pat or Beth know, as there are several boxes currently unassigned.

If you are a taxpayer and wish to donate via standing order, where your donation is paid directly into the church bank account at a frequency to suit you, please speak to me.

If you have any questions about any of this, please do speak to me; always happy to help.

Christmas Fair Proceeds

Nobody can have failed to notice that one corner of the church is cordoned off following water ingress and plaster falling from the wall. This problem has now shown itself in the vestry (the other side of the wall) and is now in urgent need of repair. "A simple process", some might say – "so get it done!" Sadly, this isn't necessarily the case. Churches are required to obtain a faculty from the Diocese which is like obtaining planning permission from the local council, a long, drawn out process and although the Parochial Church Council (PCC) obtained estimates of the cost to carry out the work, the Diocese are still to issue them with the relevant faculty.

In the meantime, clearly things are getting worse, but the PCC's hands are tied, and it is possible that the cost of repairs will rise as a result. As

a consequence, we would like to designate the proceeds from the Christmas Fair towards funding these repairs and any possible grant funding will also be explored.
