#### **Bread of Heaven**

Over the past few weeks through August the Sunday Gospel readings have been taken from John chapter 6, where Jesus, having fed the 5000, takes the opportunity to draw the attention of the crowds to his more significant purpose in bringing fulness of everlasting life, rather than merely providing lunch. We do truly give thanks to God for the blessings of home and family and friends, but he does also work in us to show us what God is like, to help us to live as his disciples, and to make us coworkers with him in the world.

I once heard someone explain evangelism as 'one beggar telling another where to find bread'. This highlights to us that we are not the answer (and don't need to have all the answers), but we are to point people to Jesus, as we ourselves have found him to be the Living Bread. I think perhaps 'one person *sharing* bread with another' is also a good way of thinking about our life as Christians. As we share our faith with others, we are not better than them – neither cleverer, nor morally superior. We are simply those who have received something good and choose to share that goodness with others (as we might if we had a loaf of bread and five fishes at a picnic...).

However weak we might feel, whatever questions we might have about our faith, if we have found Jesus to be the Living Bread, sent by the Father to give us life, we have something to share with others.

What is Parish Share?

Parishes contribute to the work of Manchester diocese by giving Parish Share. Parish Share helps cover the costs of the clergy in our diocese – their stipend and housing costs as well as national insurance and pension contributions. Those parishes which can afford it, are asked to make larger contributions to help pay for clergy costs in our most deprived areas. This is one of the strengths of our Parish Share system – that together in our diocese and in partnership with the national church, we can make sure there is a Christian presence in every community, not just those who can afford it.

Over the last few years, like many parishes in the Diocese. St Mary's has been struggling to pay our Parish Share in full. The amount we had been asked to pay in 2024 was £29,731. In 2023 it was £28,091 and we were able to pay £20,165.

There are four elements that are used to calculate Parish Share:

- A count of the members of each congregation that attend church at least 12 times per year, averaged over three years.
- The number of Parish Income Points, which is related to the annual incomes of regular members of each congregation, averaged over three years.
- The total amount of money to be raised by the Diocese via Parish Share.
- The number of children and young people that attend church on a Sunday at least 12 times per year.

The Diocese have recognised that in order to be able to budget more realistically they needed to discuss with parishes a realistic expectation for the amount of parish share they could contribute to the overall budget.

Earlier this year a discussion and agreement process began with representatives from St Mary's. At a meeting with a member of staff from the Diocese, together with an independent volunteer, we discussed:

- A review of the most up-to-date accounts
- Parish budget for the current year
- Details of any funds held in restricted or designated funds
- Total number of regular givers and an update on giving and generosity
- Cost of any outstanding repairs identified in the Quinquennial Inspection and concerns about the building

During this meeting, we reached an agreement on the amount of Parish Share that we would give in 2024, followed by agreements for 2025 and 2026. We then took the details to the PCC for approval.

Our revised Parish Share

for **2024 is £18,000** for 2025 is £19,300 for 2026 is £20,600

I am sure that these amounts are much more realistic for us and with your continued generosity we will be able to fulfil our agreement to pay these amounts.

If you are a taxpayer and do not currently gift aid your contribution, please speak to Charlotte as 20% of your donation can be claimed from the government at no cost to you. Also, have you thought of setting up a standing order or direct debit? Have you increased your donation recently? All these little steps help massively in enabling us to pay our Parish Share in full.

And if we pay in full, we are able to access grants through the Diocese which will be a great help as we look towards reordering our church room.

The Bible talks a lot about our finances and God invites us into joyful, generous and sacrificial giving. That's a challenge for us all. Does this describe our giving - individually and as a parish?

Our work together grows out of Jesus's Great Commandment which is to:

'love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind...and love your neighbour as yourself.' (Matthew 22:36-40)

We serve and worship a God who is abundantly generous with his grace, mercy and love, and therefore as God's children we are called to replicate this generosity in the way we offer ourselves in His service and that of the church. A part of our worship is giving and therefore the Parish Share is requested from each church community and at its heart, the Parish Share is a part of our response to the extraordinary generosity we have received from God

#### **Chrisian Blind Mission**

For over 115 years, CBM has been transforming lives around the world. We work with local partners, making sure people with disabilities in some

of the world's poorest communities have access to healthcare, education and a future when they can thrive.

Our vision is an inclusive world in which all people with disabilities enjoy their human rights and achieve their full potential.

We improve access to essential services, including education, healthcare and opportunities to earn a living. And when a disaster strikes, we're there providing emergency relief and supporting people with disabilities and communities to recover and rebuild. We are fighting to end the cycle of poverty and disability.

Worldwide, three out of four people who are blind don't need to be, and at least one billion people are living with a visual impairment that could have been treated or prevented.

In the world's poorest communities, millions of people are blind simply because they can't access or afford sight-saving treatment. Blindness robs people of opportunities like education, earning a living, and living independently.

- We support governments in countries where we work to improve eye health services long-term. We're laying the groundwork for lasting change.
- We provide glasses and low vision devices to those who need them. These simple tools enhance vision and empower people to lead more independent lives.

Last year, we helped over a million people gain access to eye-related medical services and helped thousands of people to see again.


