Droylsden & District Foodbank 2024

Droylsden & District Foodbank has now been in operation since December 2013.

During the year the Trussell Trust, from which our foodbank was seeded, changed its name to Trussell and its logo. That is the only change and we remain a part of their organisation.



As a reminder this is what we do:

We exist so everyone can be free from hunger.

Trussell is an anti-poverty charity and community of food banks. We work together to ensure no one in the UK needs a food bank to survive, while providing food and practical support to people left without enough money to live on.

For Droylsden & District Foodbank 2024 has seen a steady number of vouchers fulfilled and the number of people fed.

During 2024 we fulfilled 660 vouchers from 377 unique households. The average number of visits from each household was therefore 1.75. From this average figure we can see that for many families we are the answer to a short-term crisis. There are some households that need longer term support, but this is in exceptional circumstances. There were 282 first time referrals and for these families making the initial step to ask for support will have been a big decision. The referral agency they spoke to will have understood their individual circumstances and offered additional support where appropriate.

The total number of people fed was 1724 which included 726 children.

The main reasons for clients requiring the support of the Foodbank continues to be changes and delays to welfare benefit payments. Other

reasons include low income, debt, ill health, homelessness and domestic abuse.

To help clients receive additional appropriate support Droylsden & District Foodbank is working alongside Tameside South and Longdendale Foodbank to offer the services of an advisor from Citizens Advice. Appointments are made with clients when they receive their food for a CAB advisor to ring them and help in the areas of housing, debt, benefits, bereavement etc. This is a voluntary scheme but clients who have used the service have benefited and, in many cases, no longer need to use the foodbank.

The permanent collection point in Tesco Droylsden is well supported by shoppers and the annual national collection at the store provides a boost to our stock levels.

The local churches continue to support us with donations as do the local schools at harvest time and Christmas. Businesses and individuals also donate food and personal hygiene items during the year. A local company donates toilet rolls on a regular basis.

During the year the foodbank has received a generous grant to purchase food to support our work in the local community.

The stock recorded into the warehouse during 2024 was 12,311 kgs and stock out was 9,589 kgs. The weight of food purchased was 4,812 kgs.

One of our major challenges during 2024 has been the status of the warehouse where we both store our food and distribute to our clients. The rear of the unit, which is the distribution area, has suffered from a badly leaking flat roof. We have, and are continuing to, work with Tameside MBC to find the source of the leak and hopefully rectify the problem. This has not been an easy task, but we are grateful to the various Tameside departments and Droylsden Councillors for their support. Environmental Health visited to confirm that there is no impact on our food stock because of the water ingress.

We are also working with the landlord of our unit to find an alternative site for our warehouse and distribution centre which we hope will remain within Droylsden precinct.

After 11 years the Droylsden & District Foodbank continues to be supported by the community and remains an integral part of emergency food provision throughout the area

2024 has been a challenging but rewarding year for all connected to the foodbank. Wider publicity has thrown a spotlight on food poverty and the cost-of-living challenges. Droylsden & District Foodbank has met these challenges and will continue to serve our community.

A huge thank you goes to our many volunteers who work tirelessly to maintain the weekly service we provide to our clients. Their dedication, support for each other and sense of humour defines our sessions and without them 1724 people, including 736 children, would not have been fed.

Alongside Trussell we look to a future where all can afford the essentials and there will no longer be a need for foodbanks in the UK.

Thank you to all at St Mary's who have supported us in any way during the year. Please continue to pray for our work, clients and volunteers.

Daniel, one of the Beaver Scouts had written to the late Queen telling her about Beaver Scouts and a copy of the letter he received in reply was found inside the capsule. There was a copy of the Church Magazine for December 1999 inside together with a prayer that one of the Cub Scouts had written to mark the millennium and you can see it in the photograph below.

Lots of people attended the Quiz Night and the ceremonial opening of the capsule, there is a thought that another may be put together to be opened in 2050 so watch this space!


