Faith for a New Year

As we start another New Year (they do seem to come around so often now!!), we may have all sorts of hopes, dreams, and plans for the year ahead, but we really don't know what the year might hold for us – either personally or in the world around us. The verse I wanted to choose for this year was written many hundreds of years ago, but still rings true today. Since the earliest days Christians have learnt that God can be trusted through all the highs and lows of life. God promises to always be with us, to give us strength for each day, and to show his steadfast love to us.

Knowing that God is always with us doesn't mean we must always have a smile on our face, or that we must pretend to always be okay. Being real with God about the situations in our lives, and how we feel about them, opens our hearts to hear what words of hope he might want to bring to us, and gives us faith to believe that he is at work. As we do this, we will find that faith grows in us. The first step is just to talk to God, to pour out our hearts to him, in the normal, natural words we'd use with a friend.

So, whether you feel strong in faith or more than a bit wobbly, I encourage you to take that first step, to be honest with God, and then to listen, for a moment, to what words might come to you. I believe as we do this, we too, will be able to say with the psalmist 'God is a refuge for us.'

Operation Christmas Child

Another year is over for our part in Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes and Donations. I believe November 2024 was our 30th year of sending gift



shoeboxes and helping the local warehouse collect shoeboxes from around the Manchester area, check them and load large lorries. Although, for the past 4 years, we have not had a local warehouse, they are now taken to a large warehouse in Coventry; Samaritans' Purse's new HQ location.

Many of the boxes were transported and distributed in Eastern European countries with most of these boxes going to Ukraine. From a central



warehouse, the boxes would have to be transported to the many church links throughout the country and then taken locally to children in schools, hospitals, orphanages, churches, etc. As you read this in early January 2025, thousands of children will be receiving their shoebox gifts. Oh! but Christmas is over - not in

Eastern Europe as the Eastern Orthodox Church Christmas Day is the 6th of January. Then there will be thousands of shoeboxes going to several African countries by ship then long lorry or plane journeys and then distributing the boxes to children over a wide area. The planning,

logistics and costs must all be put in place by people in the countries that send and those who receive the shoeboxes, so as many children as possible will receive a gift box.



Each child receiving a box will be happy, I know many will want to know who sent the box, so they can thank them. Many of the children will be given a booklet, written in their language, for a course on learning and following Jesus in their lives.
