God's Light in the Darkness

Early in the New Year, when the Christmas tree has been taken down, and the decorations put away, we move from the Christmas story of a child born, of angels singing and shepherds visiting, to the tale of Magi – wise men travelling from the East, in search of a newborn king. We read of their meeting with King Herod in Jerusalem, and the confusion and jealous panic of Herod that ended with a massacre in Bethlehem.

In a dream the Magi were told not to return to King Herod but to go home directly, thereby protecting Jesus. Mary and Joseph fled to Egypt to live as refugees, only returning to their home when it was revealed to them in a dream that Herod, who'd sought Jesus' life, was dead.



How little the times change.

It is a complex story of human greed and hunger for power, but also of God's great, expansive love, his power to reveal, to guide and to protect.

I wonder how the lives of those Magi were changed following this whole extraordinary experience? They must surely have never been the same again.

As we see much of the same situations in our world today, let us pray for all those caught up in such dreadfully similar situations, that they too may know the amazing, saving love of God, and that his light will shine brightly in the darkness we humans seem so good at making.

Carols at Christmas

In December I was privileged to attend several concerts and services which included Christmas songs and carols.

My first concert was on the 1st December at the Bridgewater Hall. The concert raises funds for Young Lives vs Cancer.

Young Lives vs Cancer is the only charity in the UK with specialist social workers who provide tailored support to children and young people with cancer, and their families. They help them to navigate the emotional and practical impact of cancer. And they stop at nothing to make their voices heard and their unique needs understood, so they can get the right care and support at the right time. The concert is led by the Manchester and Districts Hospital Choir. The choir sing less familiar songs and the audience have the opportunity to sing along to more traditional carols. The rendition of the Twelve Days of Christmas is always chaotic as we all try to remember which action we should perform on which verse. The concert also includes two school choirs who perform magnificently on stage. This year we enjoyed the singing of St Anne's R.C Primary School Audenshaw. We are hoping that St Mary's school will be invited to sing in 2026 - watch this space.

My next carol service was on 3rd December at Coronation Street. I had the honour of being invited to the Royal Foundation of the Prince and Princess of Wales 'Together at Christmas' Community Carol Service for my work with Droylsden & District Foodbank. It was hosted by the Lord-Lieutenant of Greater Manchester. We sang four very traditional carols

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and were entertained by Bollywood dancers, the junior section of an amateur operatic society and the drum section of the Air Cadet band. Bishop Mark told the Christmas story and it's meaning through 'pass the parcel' with the winner getting to share the box of Celebrations with us all. We then enjoyed a tour of the Street walking along the famous cobbles.



Making our Christingle at the service is always a challenge but standing around the church with our candles lit reminds us of the joy Christ's birth brings to us all.

I enjoyed the traditional carol services of Aldwyn Primary School and it is always a joy to see so many children and their families singing and hearing again the Christmas story. My association with Aldwyn's carol service goes back over 65 years when I too came to church and read a part of the Christmas story.

St Mary's School carol service in church was joyful with some great moves by the children and staff as they included actions to many of their songs.

St John's Castle band concert is always an opportunity to sing along to familiar carols after enjoying music from Christmas films.



Our own church carol service, with the schools Christmas trees lit means the true start of the Christmas celebrations for me.

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I hope you were able to join us for one of our Christmas services or events. If you rested at home, I hope you found a television or radio programme to join in to your favourite Christmas carol.
