Drawing Aside with Jesus

In September I spent a few days with the sisters of the Society of the Sacred Cross, just outside Monmouth.

The convent I went to is a contemplative order, so the sisters live mainly in silence – though they would quietly ask how I was getting on and make sure I had what I needed. Even meals are eaten in silence. Of course, they pray and sing in chapel, and they will talk about aspects of work and hold meetings with one another for the care and smooth running of the community. As well as prayer and worship together and individually throughout the day, the sisters cook, clean, and work on a large kitchen garden with some delicious homegrown fruit and veg in the meals! Once I had adjusted to it, I found that the silence fostered a real sense of peace and prayerfulness.

The lack of conversation was not cold though - it was very evident that the sisters live together with warm relationships, and heart-felt welcome for those who stay with them whether for a few days or a few months. And in the quietness, punctuated with prayer, there really is a rich sense of God's loving presence and his invitation to draw close.

In the space that I found there, I spent time each day reflecting on some of the passages in Luke's Gospel of Jesus' encounters with individuals.

I was deeply struck by the compassion of Jesus for those he met. For Jesus, they were not 'yet another person with more needs', or another opportunity to show off his power, but he saw each one as an individual understood their true needs and concerns



individual, understood their true needs and concerns, and responded to each one with compassion in words and actions.

It is truly wonderful that our God is full of love and compassion for us and all his world and sees each of us as we are. It also reminds us to move beyond difference and division to see people as they are, and to respond to each with compassion.

Why Do We Share It?

We talk about sharing The Peace. In some churches, this means greeting as many people as possible with the words "The Peace of the Lord" or similar words.

In some churches it is only done with those nearest to us in the pews, in this way The Peace is shared throughout the church because one person passes it on to the next person until it has gone all the way around the church until everyone has been greeted

This is quite a challenging part of our worship because it should be more than our church friends, it's more about having an opportunity to be reconciled to anyone we may have an issue with. Someone we may have been annoyed with, hurt by or even conflicted with making it a challenging part of the service

Being reconciled with someone and trying to mend a broken relationship is addressed in Paul's teaching about the Eucharist in 1 Corinthians verse 11 where he warns about receiving holy Communion in an unworthy manner. Ideally, we should prepare through prayer before the service

Do You Like Knitting?



There is still time to knit a poppy (or more) for our poppy display for Remembrance Sunday?

Here is an easy and quick poppy pattern

You will need: Red double knitting wool and a pair of 4mm (UK8) needles

Cast on 80 sts.

Row 1 to row 8 Knit every row

Row 9 Knit 2 together (K2tog) repeat to end (40 sts)

Row 10 K2 tog to end (20 sts)

Row 11 K2 tog to end (10 sts)

Cut yarn with a long end and thread a sewing needle through remaining 10 sts, pull up tight, sew up side seam and fasten off

Sew a black button or felt circle or use black wool to make the centre of the poppy.

After months of extraordinary challenges delivering aid in Gaza, DEC charities and their local partners are now scaling up their work delivering desperately needed food, water, medical care and so much more.

Famine was confirmed in Gaza in August, and every day has been a struggle to find essential supplies. People have been dying from starvation and malnutrition. Safe and sustained access for humanitarian aid has never been more urgent.

In Lebanon, the ceasefire agreement at the end of last year meant some of the people displaced by conflict could return to their communities and start to rebuild their lives. Months on, many still have no home to return to and are cut off from basic services.

DEC charities and their local partners have been working tirelessly throughout the conflict in unimaginably difficult conditions. Each day has brought new and unexpected challenges, but they have constantly adapted their work to deliver whatever aid they can.

The DEC brings together 15 leading UK aid charities to raise funds quickly and efficiently at times of humanitarian crisis overseas. DEC charities and their local partners have been working in Gaza throughout the crisis, scaling up their response whenever the situation allows to help provide lifesaving aid to Palestinians. They have decades of expertise in working in the region to help meet people's needs, despite all the challenges.

Following the ceasefire announcement in October 2025, aid is now getting through but much more is needed.
